A short list of books and ephemera printed by women from the 18th to the 21st century including several items by Jane Grabhorn, Distaff Side, and The Janus Press.

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[Bailey, Elizabeth, printer]

CRUELTY DISARM'D AND INNOCENT TRIUMPHANT

London: Mrs. [Elizabeth] Bailey's Printing-Office, the Ship and Crown, c. 1766.

12mo. 12 pp. Removed from volume with binding residue on the spine. Fore-edge has been trimmed tightly affecting the text of each line--a couple letters of each line are lost on 4 of the 6 leaves; early dampstain to the first and last leaf; others are fairly clean.

The *English Short Title Catalogue* cites an article by Nathan Garvey in which he suggests that Elizabeth Bailey ran her husband's printing office from his death in December 1764 to sometime in 1767 when it is thought a son took it over. This imprint bearing "Mrs. Bailey's" name much then have been printed in this narrow window. Uncommon and interesting artifact of a widow's work in 18th century printing. Scarce. ESTC T505420. OCLC identified only one library holding in England (OCLC: 1263744759).

KITE'S TOWN & COUNTRY ALMANAC, FOR THE YEAR 1813, Being the First after Bissextile or Leap Year

Philadelphia: Printed by Lydia R. Bailey for Benjamin and Thomas Kite, [1812].

12mo. [48] pp. Stitched into self wrappers. Heavily worn with loss to the bottom of the cover title including, unfortunately, the imprint which bears Bailey's name. This same loss affects the note to the reader on the verso of this page; the second leaf containing an anatomical illustrations is quite ragged with a couple of large closed tears but all text is present; the balance of the almanac is in more stabile if fair condition with dog-eared corners, early tidelines, an occasional closed tear, and one leaf that has an 1/8" tear in the center of a leaf with minor loss of text.

This is an early almanac printed by Bailey, who took over her husband Robert Bailey's print shop after his death in 1808 and ran in until she retired and closed the shop in 1861. Karen Nipps in her biographical sketch writes, "Bailey was the master printer of a shop that at its peak was one of the largest in the city, employing more than forty workers. . . . [S]he transformed her husband's floundering business into one of the busiest printing establishments in Philadelphia. Although previous generations of printers' widows had continued their husbands' careers, they had done so only long enough to remarry, have a mature son take over, or fold the business; Lydia Bailey made the business a success and never relinquished control of it" (Oxford American National Biography). For better than a half a century Bailey was a force with which to reckon. An imperfect, but important imprint that captures the mainstay of her print-shop's output. Final leaf is missing the bottom third of the leaf; otherwise generally worn with many folded corners; ragged page edges; early tidelines; some insect spotting, but complete except for this final leaf. An imperfect, but important imprint that captures the mainstay of her print-shop's output. Shaw & Shoemaker 51508; Drake 11094; Nipps *Checklist*, 125.

A playful book with humorous anecdotes to accompany the linocut illustrations of desert insects and reptiles. Blocker has been an educator and book artist for decades. A very fresh copy with little wear to speak of. (OCLC: 35782969).

Bifolium. 10.5" x 7.5." [4] pp. Printed in red and black in Goudy's Deepdene and Truesdell Italic type on specially made paper watermarked with Goudy's portrait. An additional horizontal fold through the program; toning to the front and some wear at this horizontal crease; paper is weakening but remains stable.

This event was accompanied by the second Distaff Side potluck book, *Goudy Gaudeamus: In Celebration of the Dinner given Frederic W. Goudy on his 74th birthday, March Eighth, 1939.* While the birthday was the event, it was actually a January 1939 fire that destroyed Goudy's Village Press (the second such fire in the Press's history) that prompted the event and such an outpouring. The book with more than two dozen contributors was pulled together in less than two months with one of the 195 copies presented to Goudy at this dinner. (Walkup p. 173-5). A remarkably uncommon piece of Distaff Side ephemera, rarely seen in commerce. OCLC identifies fewer than 10 institutional holdings. Walkup, Kathleen. Quarto. Limited edition, one of 375 copies. Yellow cloth with vignette title in red; wrapped in publisher's glassine and in slipcase. An extremely bright copy with just a trace of sunning to the spine; glassine is ragged at the spine; slipcase is solid with light shelfwear; contents clean.

This is the third book issued by the Distaff Side, a loose collective of women who come together on occasion to create what Kathleen Walkup describes as a "potluck book"--each section is printed independently by the contributors, size and topic being the only commonalities. These sections with varying paper type and color, typefaces, and design are brought together and bound. The first so issued by the collective is the now iconic and illusive *Bookmaking on the Distaff Side* in which dozens of the most accomplished women in print came together to recognize the ways in which women have historically been overlooked in this field. This present title, A Children's Sampler, was brought out "for the benefit of cardiac and other needful children." This copy is being offered with an additional copy of Jane Grabhorn's contribution--"The Fable of Esope." As issued, marbled paper over boards with cloth spine; publisher issued glassine wrapper is present and edgeworn with some loss. A very attractive copy with light rubbing to the corners and a slight forward lean.

A very nicely printed appreciation printed in potluck fashion with sections (most unnumbered) printed by Emily Connor at the Marchbank Press, Jane Grabhorn. Unlike the three principle Distaff Side book, this appreciation includes contributions printed by men. Contributions by Mabel H. Dwiggins, Bruce Rodgers, George Macy, F. W. Goudy and others. Each contribution is printed in a different typeface, with a different design, and on different paper. A very homage to the woman who was instrumental in the successes of the Village Press.

Opening is a woodcut of a type case with a quote from Franklin's *Apology for Printers* (1730): "Printers are educated in the Belief, that when men differ in Opinion, both Sides ought to have the Advantage of being heard by the Publick; and that when Truth and Error have fair Play, the former is always an overmatch for the latter: Hence they cheerfully serve all contending Writers that pay them well, without regarding on which side they are of the Question in Dispute." As pertinent today as it was in the 18th century.

Folio. [20] Il. Limited edition, one of 40 copies. Signed and inscribed by Grabhorn. As issued, in printed paper-covered boards with cloth spine; printed in red and black and fibrous, handmade paper. Light edgewear, only. A remarkably nice copy of a vanishingly scarce early Jumbo Press title made all the more rare in commerce as more than half of the edition is held by institutions according to OCLC (OCLC: 8402612).

Though Grabhorn was deeply involved in her husband's and brother-in-law's Grabhorn Press, this is the second book printed by her under the Jumbo Press imprint, her first foray into her own private press. The book is wholly hers: she wrote, designed, set type, and printed it. It is a fascination and charming work comprising a humorous treatise "devoted to the policy of the Jumbo Press and a theory of printing" (Bender *Catalogue*, 2) and a dozen letters written by her eight year-old self from from the Convent of the Sacred Heart in Menlo Park, CA to family. Visually, it is engaging from start to finish and captures Grabhorn's capacity for fine printing and humor at taking printing too seriously. In short, it is a joy. This copy with an inscription to Lew and Dorothy Allen of the Allen Press, "from Old Jumbo / Christmas 1954." (*Compleat Grabhorn* p. 14-21).

Eleven Hungarian folk songs translated to be sung by Snodgrass with music and lyrics accompanied by masonite relief cuts by McGowan, these are printed in rose. title and text printed in black, spruce blue, and brown. A very nice and fairly early Janus Press production. Folded prospectus laid in. (Fine, *The Janus Press 1975-1980*, p. 43-44).

According fold. Approx 8" x 5". Limited edition, this is number 11 of 20 copies. Black canvas strip sewn to the covers with an rusted washer sew over the canvas to the front cover; the contents are a single accordion fold leaf; light wear and rubbing to the covers. There is no text in the book and the title is taken from the rear cover.

Wehr writes of herself on her website: "Most of my work relates to my experience as a European living in the U.S. . . . In my work I address the problems with complete understanding on both verbal and non-verbal levels, adaptation, nostalgia, isolation, dislocation and identity." This is an interesting artist's book containing a reproduction of the canvas on the covers that runs all along the folded leaf with images of various worn and rusted items sewn; all along, above and below the central line of canvas is a repeated photographic image of a smiling woman walking. A striking book with a remarkably small limitation made rare in commerce by the fact that nearly half the edition is held in institutions. (OCLC: 46828381).
